Letter From the New Director

Greetings in the mighty name of Jesus Christ!

The other day I looked up from the supper table and commented to my wife Diane, "You know, I have been working at World Renew DRS for five months now!" Yes, it's been five months, and I feel so blessed by each and every one of you. The joy and dedication that you, our DRS volunteers, give has been a blessing. Your work at disaster sites has such an impact on not only the cleanup and reconstruction work but also the spiritual and emotional well-being of those who are affected by a disaster. Each night I pray and thank God for the love that each of you bring with you.

In those short five months, I have seen DRS volunteers help people devastated by the mud slide in Washington; flooding in Michigan, Minnesota, Iowa, and South Dakota; tornadoes in Nebraska; flooding in Florida, Mississippi, and Arkansas; tornadoes in North Carolina and Grand Rapids, Michigan; flooding in Detroit and Burlington, Ontario; and an earthquake in California. We have responded with early response coordinators, many rapid response teams, unmet needs-assessment teams, ongoing long-term reconstruction crews, and group missions trips. Each time, DRS volunteers have responded with concern, prayer, financial gifts, and their presence on-site in local communities.

I have had the privilege of visiting our long-term reconstruction sites in High River, Alberta, and Ocean County, New Jersey. What a joy it has been for me to join the teams each day, before they set out to work, as they sing "This is the day; this is the day that the Lord has made. We will rejoice, we will rejoice and be glad in it and be glad in it." The expertise and Christian love our teams bring each day reflect God's peace and joy here on earth!

As many of you know, I served for thirty-five years as an executive with the Boy Scouts of America. And I believe the motto of the Boy Scouts—Be Prepared—also works for the volunteers of DRS. When disasters hit our communities, it is the wonderful volunteers of DRS who are always "**prepared**" and ready to pack up to go and help.

May God continue to bless each and every one of you as you show God's love and peace to people in communities where we are called to serve.

Bright as a Box of Crayons



World Renew DRS opened a reconstruction site in LaPlace, Louisiana, last September in response to Hurricane Isaac in 2012. One hundred and seventy-two volunteers donated over 27,270 hours to help 23 home owners repair their homes before the site closed in April of this year.

One of those homeowners is Willie McGee. World Renew DRS volunteers Joanne Oosthoek, Bonnie Diekema, Ann Evans, and Jenny Glasbergen share some thoughts about Willie and their joy in working with him:

Q: Where was Willie when Hurricane Isaac struck?

A: Willie was hoping to ride out Hurricane Isaac in his home until his mother persuaded him otherwise. He took his dog, Marco, and drove to nearby Kenner, Louisiana. Willie believed his house would not flood because it never had before in the ten years he owned it.

Q: What happened after the disaster?

A: Willie was devastated. He quickly became depressed because his cerebral palsy made it difficult for him to walk, and he was unable to clean up anything or salvage his

possessions from the three feet of water that flowed into his home. Later he also lost his job, which added to his frustrations.

Q: Did Willie experience any unexpected blessings after the disaster?

A: Yes, while he was living with his mother, since his home was unsafe to live in, he was contacted by the local recovery group who assessed his needs for getting rebuilding assistance. And, after a year and a half and much questioning about the repairs needed on his home, Willie received the first World Renew DRS reconstruction team. He also unexpectedly received a job offer. Things were looking up for him.

Q: What work did you do on his home?

A: We were able to install or repair drywall, ceramic flooring, kitchen cupboards, new doors and trim, paint the walls, and make electric upgrades or replacements. He chose paint colors that were bright and flooring that would be best for special footwear he requires.

Q: What do these repairs mean for him?

A: His restored home meant continued independence for Willie. His sense of purpose, dignity, and zest for life has returned! His faith in others lending a helping hand has brought him great hope and health. He gives God praise for the DRS work teams that have restored his home and says God has answered his questions in very specific ways.

Q: Tell us about the colors Willie chose for his home.

A: Willie picked out very bright colors for his walls. We had a few reservations about his choices at first, but then we recognized the reason behind them: bright colors lift his spirits. After working with him for just a short while, we could say that those colors do reflect Willie! One of his friends suggested that he get a box of crayons because it would match the colors of his home. We have been blessed to help and get to know Willie as we worked on his home.

He Helped Us see that Good Things can Come from a Storm

"The sirens had stopped, and Anthony was outside on the patio watching the approaching tornado, thinking that it was going to miss his house. Then all of a sudden the wind shifted, and he hurried down to the basement," said Lois Schoonveld, the leader of a group mission trip from Christ Community Reformed Church (RCA) in Lemont, Illinois.

The group, made up of volunteers from age 14 to 82, spent a week helping Anthony and other survivors of the November 2013 tornado in Washington, Illinois.

After the tornado passed, Anthony realized that the walls of his house were damaged, and many windows were broken. Then rain poured in and ruined the basement. The home was unlivable.

Soon after Anthony moved in with his father, they found out that his father was suffering from a serious illness and by April he passed away.

"Even through that heartache, Anthony recognized that God spared his life during the tornado and gave him the special gift of time with his father, to help him until his last days," Schoonveld said.

Seven months after the tornado, the team of 14 people from Christ Community RCA helped Anthony put his home back in order.

"Anthony was so pleased that a church group would come and help him with this task," says Schoonveld. "He felt blessed by God and wasn't afraid to say so."

Cascade Fellowship Serves in Florida

"We were so happy to serve Betty when we worked on her home," said Lisa Groeneveld, a volunteer group leader from Cascade Fellowship in Grand Rapids, Michigan. "Betty's family was a close-knit group that was struggling to make ends meet. Her house flooded and the roof collapsed in a storm. Because the damage was not addressed properly, there was a lot of mold. As a result, all of the drywall in the home had to be removed. Our team installed and mudded new drywall, painted, and did the trim work. Betty said we were an answer to prayer and a blessing. We were happy to be of service."

Groeneveld and the group from Cascade Fellowship served two families from Vernon, Florida, this year whose homes suffered wind and flood damage in July 2013.

"While we were in Vernon, we helped a man named Charlie who was unable to use either the kitchen or the bathroom in his home because of flood damage. Charlie had been helping others in his neighborhood repair their damaged properties, but he wasn't able to fix his home on his own. So with World Renew DRS, Cascade Fellowship volunteers removed and reinstalled the flooring, stained the cabinets and put in baseboards, mudded, sanded, and installed a shower and toilet at Charlie's house. He told us that we helped renew his faith in God and in people. 'There are good people out there,' he said. Since then, Charlie has continued to help others in need."

Across North America, DRS Volunteers Respond

Reconstruction Sites

Project Managers Rich and Phyl Grevenstuk continue to receive work from our partners at our Ocean County, New Jersey, site. They assure us there will be plenty of work for a couple of years. Reconstruction teams that are based in Ocean County travel to Atlantic City and other communities along the coast to repair homes that were damaged or destroyed by Hurricane Sandy in October 2012. Two-week volunteers provided labor on the site over the summer, and in September the schedule returned to a three-week volunteer rotation.

Volunteers at our other year-round site in **High River**, **Alberta**, are enjoying new living quarters. World Renew DRS workers are now being housed south of the city in an eightbedroom ranch and a trailer with six single bedrooms. Volunteers in High River were on two-week assignments through the summer and Project Managers Henry and Linda Visscher transitioned the site to a three-week rotation in September.

New Sites for 2015

World Renew DRS is pursuing several options for additional reconstruction sites that are located primarily in the southern U.S. Please pray that God is glorified in our efforts, that we will discern His plans for us, and that we will be where He wants us in 2015.

We continue to receive requests for unmet needs assessments for smaller but still devastating storms that happened this spring and summer throughout the U.S. and Canada. Needs assessment volunteers responded on the following sites in August.

A Busy 2014



2014 is, so far, an eventful year for natural disasters around the world. World Renew is responding to spring and summer storms across North America, helping families recover from tornadoes and floods. Cleanup is an important step—a first step in the recovery process. With more than forty years of experience, World Renew DRS provides services to communities through all stages of recovery, including

- cleaning up homes and property initially.
- identifying those who are vulnerable so that their needs are met with justice and equity.
- building the capacity of the local community to begin to meet its own needs and then thrive.
- repairing and rebuilding homes months and years after a disaster strikes.

Here is a monthly summary of World Renew DRS responses to date in 2014.

MARCH

Residents in Oso, **Washington**, experienced a massive mudslide, and World Renew's experienced regional manager for that area has been supporting families who were affected.

APRIL

Widespread tornadoes and storms tore through the United States, from Nebraska to North Carolina, Mississippi, Arkansas to Florida, and more. World Renew DRS sent rapid response cleanup teams to areas of West Michigan to help families muck out flooded homes.

Flooding in Iowa.

JUNE

A rapid response team, joined by local volunteers, responded to flooding in **Iowa** and **Minnesota** by mucking out flooded homes and providing mold remediation services. World Renew DRS has also been active in tornado-affected **Nebraska** and flooded areas of **Florida**. Flooding and a tornado also affected portions of **South Dakota**. World Renew DRS construction estimators surveyed damaged homes and provided residents who qualify for help with estimates for reconstruction costs.

JULY

In response to a July tornado, early response coordinators, rapid response teams, and an unmet needs assessment team were active in **West Michigan**.

There was flooding in Tweed, **Ontario,** in July, and World Renew DRS is making plans to rebuild the home of a family in need that was affected by the disaster.

AUGUST

World Renew DRS is responding to the Burlington, **Ontario**, and Detroit, **Michigan**, floods. Volunteers helped with clean up shortly after the events.

Ebola Outbreak

The chances that you have heard about the recent ebola outbreak in West Africa are pretty certain. Did you know that the organization you volunteer with is responding to this health crisis? The only way to stop ebola is to prevent its transmission or to diagnose and treat the symptoms early.

World Renew's local partner in Sierra Leone, CCSL, is raising awareness about ebola in "hot spots" around the country. CCSL is educating communities about: how ebola is spread; recognizing the symptoms; what to do if you have the symptoms; preventing transmission; and the role of the whole community in dealing with ebola. The information is being translated into local languages in the affected areas. CCSL is working closely with Christian and Muslim leaders and setting up a taskforce for ebola response in each community to educate residents and monitor suspected cases.

Gaza, Iraq, the Ukraine

World Renew is also responding to the turmoil in Gaza, Iraq, and the Ukraine. Millions of people have been displaced and lives have been destroyed by the conflicts and persecution. Your prayers and support are urgently needed. Find out more and get involved at worldrenew.net.
