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Churches and DRS Together

"I think that after the flood there were more people willing to reach out to help others and work together than ever before," said Pastor J.J. Wicke. "The October 2015 flood was unlike anything anyone had ever seen. Some people lost everything."

Wicke also said that there is beauty that can come from a hardship: disasters like the floods in Texas have a way of connecting people together to help each other, often in ways that only the Lord can orchestrate.

Wicke is the pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Weslaco, Texas, which is housing World Renew Disaster Response Services (DRS) volunteers while they serve the community with flood recovery and rebuilding.

"In January 2016, our church made a commitment to use one of our buildings for mission housing as the Lord sees fit. Two weeks later, World Renew DRS contacted us to see if we would consider housing volunteers," said Wicke. "The timing was perfect. Of course we said yes."

World Renew DRS is committed to serving flood survivors in Weslaco and the Rio Grande Valley from September 2016 to May 2017. DRS volunteers from across the United States and Canada are repairing the flood-damaged homes there every week.

"World Renew DRS volunteers clearly have a heart for serving others. When they are here, they don't just work on homes, they talk about God and truly care about the people they are here to serve," said Wicke. "Some of the DRS volunteers volunteer at our monthly food pantry on Saturday — their day off."

Reconstruction Sites

DRS-managed reconstruction sites are back in full swing after closing down for several weeks in December and January. In Saipan, we were reminded to stay flexible and trust the Lord when we learned we needed to find new volunteer housing. The Lord opened doors, new housing was appropriated, and the work is still going strong. It is very hot in Saipan, so the teams are taking it easy to accommodate the temperatures. Thank you to everyone who has and will travel across the globe to serve in this response. Thank you to Ric and Dee Scott, Bill and Corry Kuyvenhoven, and Harv and Verla Klaver for each spending more than six weeks in the role of site leader.

Volunteers are working hard at DRS-managed sites in **Texas**, in San Marcos and Rio Grande Valley.

Bob, director of DRS, spent time at both of these sites in November and was impressed not only with the contributions of the volunteers, but also the congregations that are hosting the work teams. Housing a group of volunteers on a weekin, week-out basis is no small commitment, and we are thankful that the Lord has led these churches to partner with DRS in serving their communities.

DRS volunteers are responding to wildfires in Calaveras County, **California**, by working on new builds. There is no shortage of work! The campground where volunteers are lodged is working out well. The site is nearby several churches that support the work DRS is doing there, and there is a unique opportunity for local, daylong volunteers to work with the team to get a taste of what it's like

to volunteer at one of our sites. We hope they love it and sign up for a three-week assignment!

The DRS response to a 2016 tornado in Century, **Florida**, is continuing. Local TV stations have done a number of news segments and interviews with our work team members there. The volunteers shared stories about the home rebuilding needs that remain after the tornado hit in spring of 2016. One homeowner said, "It was like Christmas when I got my new roof!"

Needs Assessments

In October, Bruce and Christine de Boer led a needs assessment in Fort McMurray, **Alberta**, that helped the local recovery group determine which residents needed



assistance to recover from historic wildfires that occurred in May 2016. Even in their heartache, the hope of Christ was evident. The information collected from the needs assessment is essential to the local recovery group, World Renew, and other partnering organizations as we continue to make plans for reconstruction.

After **Louisiana** experienced incredible flooding in April and August 2016, World Renew DRS sent several teams to conduct needs assessments. Jerry and Nancy Brouwer led a team in Tangipahoa Parish in October. In January, Walt and Carol Ackerman led a team in Livingston Parish, and Denny and

In November, Ben and Char Dykema led an assessment team in Waller County, **Texas**, in response to flooding in the spring of 2016.

Rapid Response

In October, Hurricane Matthew raked across Haiti and the eastern U.S. North Carolina was hit particularly hard by torrential rain and flooding. DRS was contacted immediately by our long-time partners, and we quickly deployed Rapid Response teams to do clean up. The first team served in Windsor and the second team worked in Tarboro, North Carolina. Volunteers came from Michigan, New York, Florida, and Ontario. Thanks to all who served, and special thanks to Marc Faasse and Lois Hecksel for their leadership.

A remnant of Hurricane Matthew traveled as far north as **Nova Scotia** where it caused extensive flooding along the coast. Many thanks to

Dirk and Margaret VanOord for recruiting two teams, one from New Brunswick and the other from Prince Edward Island, that traveled to Sydney, Nova Scotia, to do clean up with World Renew partner, Samaritan's Purse.

Group Mission Trips

Groups of all types, ages, and sizes are making significant contributions to the ministry of DRS by responding to disasters in more than a dozen locations where they are cleaning up flooded homes and rebuilding houses.

This winter, several DRS group volunteers are concentrating their efforts in **West Virginia** and **South Carolina**. Some groups are taking on whole-house projects in West Virginia while others are working on an intensive, short-term reconstruction site in Sumter, South Carolina. Thanks to Rob and Sharon Schelling and Bruce and Marcia Fallis for providing leadership and continuity in this effort.

Hope Shines in Fort McMurray

"A young mother stopped by a World Renew walk-in center in Fort McMurray, Alberta, to meet with World Renew Disaster Response Services (DRS) volunteers. Her family lost their home and all of their possessions in a wildfire last May."

"The family is struggling but they are also turning to God for strength and direction in their lives," said Barb Bracko, a World Renew DRS volunteer in Fort McMurray. "Sometimes a tragedy can become a stepping stone to greater faith."

Barb and other World Renew DRS volunteers met with the young mother and many other Fort McMurray residents in October and November 2016 after wildfires destroyed roughly 2,400 structures and 1.5 million acres of land in Alberta the previous May.

Barb said that she saw the hope of Christ shining through the ashes many times in Fort McMurray.

"One of the striking features about the population of Fort McMurray is its diversity. There are people from every continent who settled there to find work in what has been called 'Canada's boom town.' With such great diversity, discord between ethnic and religious groups could grow quickly. But after the fire forced the entire city to evacuate, people were even more unified than before. They say, 'We don't shake hands in Fort McMurray. We hug.' These residents are an example for all of Canada and other countries that are welcoming home some of the 65 million refugees, or one in every 113 people, in the world today. In times of need, we are all called to 'love our neighbors as ourselves' (Matt 22:39).

"Another couple who came to the World Renew walk-in center was struggling to start their life over after the fire

destroyed their home. When our team followed up with them a few days later, the husband said that he and his wife prayed with our volunteers who interviewed them. It was then that he realized that 'This is what I'm missing. I have forgotten about God.' The man has been meeting with his pastor since then. We may forget about God, but He never forgets about us. 'I will never forget you. See, upon the palms of my hands I have written your name.'" (Is 49:15-16)

The World Renew DRS needs assessments connect disaster survivors to recovery resources in their own communities and are a key step in the reconstruction process, identifying individuals and families who need home repair services.

Today, plans are underway for reconstruction in Fort McMurray as DRS Regional Managers work together with Mennonite Disaster Services and local officials; there are still many details to be worked out before work can begin. Your continued prayers are welcome. Pray for the planning process as well as for the individuals and families not yet recovered after last year's fires. Pray that the hope of Christ continues to be strongly felt as recovery plans progress.

Blanket Exercise at DRS

Teams of Native peoples and other North Americans from Canada and the United States developed an activity called "the blanket exercise." There are both American and Canadian versions of this awareness-building activity, which Synod 2015 called "a practical, powerful, experiential way to understand Native peoples' history in the Canadian and American contexts" (crcna.org/ blanket exercise).



In December DRS staff, volunteers, and other participants completed the blanket exercise and many of the participants found it startling. During a time of debriefing, one group member said, "This was by no means a pleasant experience, but it was an important and eye-opening one." Another participant said, "It's disheartening that U.S. history doesn't give an accurate picture of what really happened to the Native American people and culture." Participating in the blanket exercise is part of the ongoing efforts of DRS to expand cultural awareness among our staff and volunteers.

Reaching out in Aleppo

"Final message — people are dying since last night. I am very surprised I am tweeting right now and still alive. . . . I am very sad no one is helping us in this world, no one is evacuating me and my daughter. Goodbye."

These are the haunting words of a Syrian mother living in eastern Aleppo. In December, Syrians in Aleppo were using Twitter and other social media tools to cry out to the world that abandoned them. Since then, reports of unimaginable suffering there have emerged in the media and online.

In Syria, this is neither the first offensive by one combatant group over another, nor the last. For years, attacks like December's massacre have killed, wounded, or trapped thousands of civilians. In the violence, mothers and fathers, and sons and daughters, shared their desperate, bone-chilling pleas for the world to hear.

World Renew is committed to respond to the enormous needs of the people in Aleppo. We are working with local church partners that are already on the ground to reach out to families who are most affected by the crisis. The most immediate needs are food, water and blankets.
