More than 80 percent of Cambodia’s population relies on farming to survive, their crops providing just enough to feed their family — *if the weather cooperates*. This subsistence farming leaves people malnourished, at risk, and unable to afford things like medicine, school fees, or building supplies. **Subsistence is the opposite of abundance.**

A chicken sounds like a flimsy tool for addressing subsistence, and, alone, it might be. **But when World Renew provides someone with a chicken, we do this in the context of community organizing, agricultural training, and support in finding markets and growing a micro-business.** You see, we want our brothers and sisters around the world to experience the *abundant* life God wants for them. We want them to have not just resources, but resilience, not just success but self-respect, not just opportunity but transformation.

Mrs. Sao Thorn received chickens from World Renew as part of an agriculture project she joined in her village. She built a chicken coop in her yard and conscientiously applied all she learned.

In a country where parents often find themselves forced to leave their children in the village and find factory work in the city to survive, Mrs. Thorn now earns more income working at home. She sells chickens to pay her children’s school fees and her garden is thriving with the addition of chicken manure fertilizer, so she sells gourds, beans, and bananas for even more extra income. Her success and hard work have made her a village leader.

World Renew uses chickens around the world as an opportunity toward a more abundant life. This year, your gift of a chicken will offer someone in Kenya or India a steppingstone from subsistence to abundance.
